Foreign Envoys Convinced Russians
Are Seeking A-Bomb Control Agreement

MOSCOW, Feb. 12 (AP)—Talk of the possibilities of achieving world-wide atomic control has been revived in Moscow's diplomatic circles.

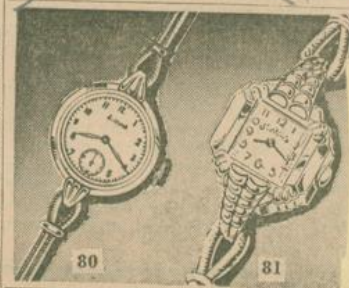
Senator Demands Truman Purge Department; Says Secretary Harbors 205 Communists

Rankin Charges Einstein Activity With Red Front

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (U.P.)—Rep. John E. Rankin (D) Miss., said today that Scientist Albert Einstein has a record of Communist-front activity for which he should have been deported years ago.

Rankin put in the House record a report from the Un-American Activities Committee picturing Einstein as having been associated with a number of groups listed as Communist fronts.

Rankin Angered

The committee report was dated today. It was prepared for Rankin, summarizing material on Einstein in the committee's files.

Rankin's blast was prompted by Einstein's statement that the only solution to the present atomic arms race is a "supra-national judicial and executive body" to settle security problems.

Rankin attacked Einstein as "one of the greatest fakers the world ever knew."

Scientist Pose

"Ever since he published his book on relativity, to try to convince the world that light had weight, he has capitalized upon the alleged reputation as a scientist.

"He has been engaged in Communist activities in this country for a long time . . . He had no more to do with development of the atomic bomb than if there hadn't been such a thing. American scientists developed the atomic bomb."

COSTLIEST AUTOMOBILE

President Gets His New Gold-Plated Car

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—President Truman's new car arrived today, with its gold-plated cigarette lighter and trimmings and built-in umbrella rack.

An official of the Ford Motor Co. called this—the first of 10 which will be delivered to the White House—the most expensive Lincoln ever built.

Mr. Truman isn't buying the cars. They're being built as part of a prestige promotion by Ford and then rented to the White House.

Valentine Tallberg, a Ford administrative engineer, was the official who said it was the most expensive Lincoln of all time. But he said that even he didn't know how expensive it was.

Too Busy to Figure

"We've been too busy to figure up the cost," he told reporters.

But it isn't hard to see that the black limousine cost a pretty penny.

All the hardware in the back

seat is gold-plated. The cigarette lighter. The door handles. The door sills. The intercom job over which Mr. T. can talk to whoever is in the front seat.

[Editor's Note—When The Times published a dispatch several weeks ago saying the President was getting a gold-plated car, White House "sources" denied it.]

Longer Wheelbase

But there are other costs which are less obvious. The car has been lengthened so that it has a 145-inch wheelbase. It also has running boards for the Secret Service men.

Tallberg said the car weighs 6400 pounds as compared with 4400 pounds for the normal Lincoln.

In announcing its inability to reach a verdict, the jury of eight women and four men reported that it stood hopelessly deadlocked at 9 to 3.
