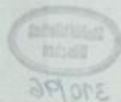
Dear Mr. Eisenstein, -

I do apologize for answering your beautiful letter of July 24th so belatedly. But I spent all that time in various hospitals (owing to a most tiresome bone complaint) and never stopped working while trying to get well.

I found your letter both moving and initiated, and I also think that you are quite right in applying the "small antidote" you devised. There is but one point in your letter which, I am afraid, concerns the English translation of my father's work and not that work proper. You speak of "the slight stoop of pompousness" in spite of which one is grateful". In actual fact there was no "pompousness" about him, and he always cringed ~~when~~ that term appeared in any American or English criticism of one of his books. For the rest I admire your ability to grasp all he meant to convey, and wish to thank you cordially for your letter.

Yes, in the long run I hope to do a full-scale T. M.-biography. At present I am editing three volumes of selected letters, writing screen plays ("Tonio Kröger", and "The Magic Mountain") as well as trying to continue to regain my health.
